

Airport connections

The easiest way to get from the airport to the city centre (Station Wien Mitte) and vice versa is the City Airport Train (CAT − 11 €). The cheaper alternative is the regional train







which also stops at Wien Mitte (around 5 €) but needs a little bit longer. Both are leaving directly from the airport (Station Flughafen Wien); you can purchase the tickets at the airport (vending machines at the train station).

Public transports in Vienna

Vienna has a vast network of public transportation — subway, tram, bus. For each ride, you need to purchase a ticket at a vending machine (single ticket costs around 2,40 €). It is also possible to buy short-term tickets (e.g. for 72-hours). Further information on the public transport and ticket system you will find here. For directions, we recommend you the Route Planner of the federal railway: ÖBB.

Training venue – how to get there?

The Training Event will take place at the Centre for Teacher Education located at Porzellangasse 4. There are three metro stations and one tramway station nearby the Centre.

- Metro U2 Stop: Schottentor -> continue with tramway line D until stop: Schlickgasse, or go on a 10-minute walk directly to the venue.
- Metro U4 Stop: Schottenring -> go on a 12-minute walk directly to the venue.
- Metro U4 Stop: Roßauer Lände -> go on a 7-minute walk directly to the venue.

The City

About the University of Vienna

The <u>University of Vienna</u> is one of the most prestigious and largest universities in Europe and offers a wide range of degree programmes: from education, philosophy and culture to natural life sciences, mathematics and many more. Currently, about 92,000 students from 140 different nations benefit from this offer. The University of Vienna is also the largest research and educational institution in Austria with a total of 6,700 academics. The teaching staff embeds the principle of research-led teaching in their lectures. They impart knowledge about the latest research findings in their courses and their students are able to participate in original research.

To address the growing societal and economic challenges, there is an increasing demand for universities to use their knowledge from research and teaching to fulfil their so-called "Third Mission" in society and economy. This implies taking responsibility, actively and consciously, for the society on whose behalf they are working. At the university multiple activities directly relevant to the Third Mission are ongoing. The University of Vienna celebrated its 650th Anniversary in 2015. It is the oldest university in the German-speaking world and one of the oldest universities in Europe.







Within the University of Vienna, the <u>Centre for Teacher Education (ZLB)</u> is the organisational and coordinating interface for all tasks related to teacher education. It cooperates with faculties/centres of the University of Vienna and partners from the North-East Schools' Group (the university colleges of teacher education in Lower Austria and Vienna, the University College of Teacher Education of Christian Churches Vienna/Krems and the University College for Agrarian and Environmental Pedagogy) to improve and develop the quality of teacher education in research and teaching. It is available for questions about teacher education and is the main contact point for students, as well as for schools and teachers who would like to become involved in teacher education.

One field of work of the ZLB is the <u>Language Teaching and Learning Research Unit</u> which deals with the teaching, learning and usage of languages. These research topics require an interdisciplinary approach for which the Language Teaching and Learning Research Unit brings together perspectives from Applied Linguistics, Cognitive Sciences, Subject-Specific Didactics, and Language Policy. The Unit does not have its own study programme but offers teaching in the study programmes of Linguistics, in language studies (English Studies, Romance Studies) and in the Teacher Education Programme.

Worth a Visit

Being the federal capital, largest city and even an own state of Austria, Vienna has much to offer. Probably the first thing that comes to mind when someone mentions this vibrant city is music - Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, Strauss, Falco, Conchita - we had them all! Some of them liked it so much that they even stayed in Vienna in the beautiful premises of the <u>Central Cemetery</u>.

The City of Music has gained this reputation not only because of the luminaries who worked here but also because of the plurality of theatres, opera houses and concert halls. In the <u>Sound Museum</u>, you can get a general idea about this melodious side of Vienna, or dive right into a play.

It is in Vienna, where you can get an authentic Wiener Schnitzel - a cutlet of pork or veal







that is prepared in the best way possible. You can get it almost everywhere, and if you're a creature of the night, there are some mouth-watering sausages at the Würstelstand - a late night snack you can get at every corner in the Inner City. Those with a sweet tooth will be over the moon with Sachertorte and Apfelstrudel - so watch out, Vienna's going to feed you up!

Even one of the most famous residents of Vienna, Sigmund Freud, realized the pleasure behind Viennese pastries and expressed it in his famous pleasure principle, which you can get to know in the <u>Sigmund Freud Museum</u>.

The best thing about Vienna is that you don't need a fixed destination. It is the city itself which puts a spell on you with its multiple styles - from Biedermeier to <u>Art Nouveau</u> over modern <u>graffiti at the Danube Canal</u>. Wherever you look - the streets are soaked with history.

Useful Information

The official language in Austria is German. There is a specific dialect spoken in Vienna, called Viennese German or (in German) Wienerisch.

Vienna has an oceanic climate bordering a humid subtropical climate. The city has relatively warm summers, and winters are relatively dry and very cold with average temperatures at about freezing point. Spring is variable and autumn usually cold, with possible snowfalls already in November.

The euro, the single European currency, is the official currency of Austria. Foreign money and euros can be brought in and out of Vienna without any restrictions.
